About the Task Force on the Use of Deadly Force in Community Policing

The Legislature approved and the Governor signed into law House Bill 2908 in 2016 creating a Joint Legislative Task Force on the Use of Deadly Force in Community Policing. The task force must submit a report to the Governor and the appropriate committees of the Legislature by December 1, 2016. A minority report must also be submitted along with the task force's report if requested by any task force member.

The task force must:

- review laws, practices, and training programs regarding the use of deadly force in Washington state and other states;
- review current policies, practices, and tools used by or otherwise available to law enforcement as an alternative to lethal uses of force, including tasers and other nonlethal weapons; and
- recommend best practices to reduce the number of violent interactions between law enforcement officers and members of the public.
